Feedback Obtained

Education institutions continually upgrade its infrastructure, expand its outreach in terms of diversity of courses and modify the pedagogy to suit the requirements of the students in particular and the society at large. Conferment of autonomy to our institution has facilitated the college to evaluate its advantages and shortfalls through in-house analysis of the feedbacks received from various stakeholders like students, parents, alumnae etc. These feed backs are obtained in the form of suggestions or through feedback forms devised by IQAC. The college is presently working on devising a roboust mechanism of obtaining the feedback from various stakeholders in a structured manner to assess the best practices and the shortcomings of the institution. The focus is to formulate a procedure to periodically review the performance of the various aspects of the teaching learning pursuits of the college based on the satisfaction level of the students as indicated in their feed backs. These inputs so obtained through the feedbacks shall form the basis for initiating measures for progression of the institution. Presently the college has adopted a two pronged strategy to get the feedbacks 1. Top down strategy 2. Bottom up strategy 1. Top down strategy:- The functioning of the college is regulated by different bodies which include "Board of Studies" of different subjects, "Academic Council", "Governing Body", University of Jammu and department of Higher education Govt. of Jammu and Kashmir. Formal and informal discussions with the members of these bodies regarding the curricular revision / enrichment, augmentation of the infrastructure, diversity of courses, introduction of courses focused on employability and other relevant inputs facilitate the college to strategize and prioritize the developmental advances for the benefit of the students. 2. Bottom up Strategy:- the feedback inputs are received from the students , parents, Alumnae, corporate houses (end users). Students are asked to submit their assessment of the functioning of the college in terms of the completion of the course content, availability of the sufficient facilities for extracurricular activities, and other relevant infrastructure. Suggestions are sought from parents and alumnae in the meetings organized for the purpose about their expectations from the college and the level of satisfaction they draw from the present state of affairs. Suggestions are also sought from the members of corporate sector who are included in the various boards of studies of different subjects about the demands of the employment market and the initiatives the college has to take to enhance the employability of the students aspiring to enter the job market after graduation. The suggestions and the feedbacks are thoroughly analyzed by a team of senior faculty and IQAC. Proposals for continuance of the best practices of the college and improvements in the areas which have been red flagged in the different feedbacks received from the stakeholders are submitted for consideration

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The college right from its inception has regularly upgraded the infrastructure and curricular diversity much in sync with the aspirations and future prospects of the students. The college has always viewed education as a means for holistic development of the students but not merely restricted to the completion of the course content to make the students eligible for the award of degrees. The students enter the portals of the college at a stage of the life when they are physically, physiologically, emotionally and psychologically at a conflict with themselves as well as with the surroundings. The students require a sensible hand holding to come out from such conflicts without bruising their ego. Personal connect of the teachers and the students based on mutual trust, sets up the path for the students to overcome their external and internal demands. The basic objective of Mentor- Mentee scheme is to develop this personal connect of the teachers (Mentors) and students (Mentees) so that the students feel at ease to discuss and seek help from the mentors for all their predicaments besides the curricular concerns. Our College deals with nearly 5800 students on daily basis and to develop this one to one personal connect with all the students has always been a challenge. Presently the science faculty of the college are entrusted the mentorship of the students of the practical groups assigned to them. The teachers take care of all concerns of the students of their respective practical groups. The faculty of English and other MIL languages are made mentors of various sections of Arts Commerce streams run in the College. All mentors take it on to themselves to

apprise the students about the various rules and regulations guide them about the accommodation issues, sort out their timetable and other relevant issues and other curricular concerns. Right through the session these students seek help and discuss issues with their mentors. In addition to this the college has introduced a regular Mentor- Mentee system on a limited level this year. All faculty members including the teachers engaged on academic arrangement, enrolled two students each as their mentees .only the students of Sem.1st were enrolled as the mentees with the idea that these students will be groomed for three consecutive years of their stay in the college. The mentors established a personal connect with mentees and framed a well thought out plan of participation in different curricular and extracurricular activities for each mentee of his/her group. The aptitude and interests of each mentee was considered while encouraging her to participate in different activities aimed at developing the overall personality. The mentors wherever required offered personal help to address emotional issues of the mentees.

College values the role of physical infrastructure (well equipped laboratories, spacious class rooms, rich library, Sports facilities, Auditorium etc) in imparting holistic education to the students. Laboratories: . All laboratories are annually enriched with materials and equipments as per the needs of the students and the course requirements. Each laboratory is scientifically maintained by a trained Lab. Assistant, supported by Lab. Bearers under the supervision of the faculty and head of the concerned Department. Proper stock and consumption registers are maintained, the stocks are periodically checked and the annual requirements are worked out. Stock verification is carried out periodically by a committee of faculty constituted for the purpose to identify unserviceable equipment /materials. Library: is the touchstone of the quality of education being imparted in an institution. The functioning and maintenance of the library is done by a team of trained library staff under the advisory role of library committee and Principal. Library committee takes the responsibility for purchase of books on the recommendations of HODs, faculty and students. Library staff takes care in proper maintenance, meticulous stacking and efficient dispensing of the books. The books are periodically fumigated and air dried to prevent them from termites and soiling

Library functions on an open access system for the faculty and students. Issuance registers are maintained on daily basis and library staff ensures that books issued are returned within fifteen days. Sports are integral to the academic calendar of the college, aimed to help students to improve their physical fitness, mental toughness and leadership qualities. Sports activities are coordinated by a qualified physical instructor, assisted by a team of support staff. Further, that a sports committee comprising of faculty and student representatives is constituted to suggest improvements in the overall sports scenario of the college. The committee also recommends the purchase of new sports equipment, sports kits and measures to be initiated to maintain and develop sports facilities for the overall growth of sports culture in the College. Students with potential for excellence are publicly felicitated supported financially to the extent permissible under rules. Gymnasium with a good stock of equipments is maintained and upgraded by sports department under the advisory role of sports committee and the Principal. Maintenance of IT equipments and their periodic up gradation is recommended by IT technical committee of the College. Thorough review of the furniture and accessories available in the classrooms is conducted at end of each academic session. Replacements / repairs of desks and face lifting of class rooms are carried out periodically. Plumber electrician appointed by the college maintain uninterrupted water supply and electricity respectively. Hostel warden, matron and other support staff take care of the hostellers. Medical dispensary is operated by medical assistant in the campus. Other items like, Xerox machines, water purifier and drinking water cooler, fridges etc. are serviced /repaired on regular basis. In general all required efforts are put to maintain the physical infrastructure and optimize its utilization for the benefit of the students and other stakeholders.

6.1.1 Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words) The basic aim of granting autonomy to an institution is to provide an opening for decentralization and participative management in the overall affairs of the organization. In line with this spirit, a working plan about running the affairs of the college has been formulated, wherein each stakeholder (students, faculty, administrative staff, principal and the society) is assigned some additional role for effective, harmonious and transparent functioning of the institution. The Principal who is the administrative head of the institution has framed various committees (Development, Purchase, Stationery Printing Scholarship/student welfare etc). Each committee is broad based comprising of a convener (usually a senior faculty of the college) and various members from the faculty, ministerial section and in some cases student representatives also. The heads of each department also plays a very pivotal role in the participative management of the institution. The heads of the departments in consultation with departmental teachers is empowered to make adjustments for teaching plan of the departments, convenes departmental meetings, oversees the paper setting, moderation, evaluation and submission of internal assessments, planning intra departmental debates and seminars, remedial measures for weaker students. The head can also convene parent-teacher meet in which academic progress of the students can be communicated to their parents. The faculty plays a crucial role in decision making through their representation in the Governing body, Academic Council, Board of studies, IQAC and advisory committees. In addition to this the faculty as the members and conveners of different committees like admission, purchase, development, discipline, scholarship /student welfare etc. constituted at the beginning of each academic year function effectively in running the affairs of the college. The teachers also discharges their duties proactively as motivators to spearhead socially, culturally and nationally conscious activities in the institution by working in NSS, NCC, Extension Work, Sports and Womens Study Cell among various other activities.

Admission of Students	The facility of ICT has been effectively utilised for all the	

admissions to the UG and PG programmes. All the admissions were made through the on-line mode for the benefit of the admission seekers. This streamlined, reduced chances of errors and made admissions highly reliable, hassle free and transparent. All relevant details about the admissions were made available on the college web site well in advance to facilitate the admission seekers and other stakeholders at large. All payments from registration to admission fee were made through online mode for which a separate online payment plugin was set for the convenience of the students.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The college is concertedly striving to created an ecosystem for innovation and training of stakeholders, for transfer of knowledge from institution to industry and vice-versa. In this regard, MOUs have been signed with FCI (Food Craft Institute, Jammu), Govt. of India and J. D. Institute of Fashion and Technology, Jammu center. Students particularly from home science were encouraged to avail benefits under this scheme and equip themselves with the knowledge and skill needed for becoming self reliant. Industrial visits planned and conducted by the college for the students is a regular feature for exposing them to the applied part of acquired knowledge in the classroom teaching. College runs a six months diploma course in Fashion Designing Tailoring under Community College Scheme of UGC.

Human Resource Management

The institution practices participative management and sharing of responsibilities for effective implementation of the of the various action plans. The principal being the head of the institution supervises the functioning of each section of the college. The Principal has decentralized powers among the members of the staff by framing different committees like development, purchase, library, sports, student's welfare etc. wherein senior most faculty acts as convener of the committee. Each department is looked after by the senior most faculty as its head to manage the affairs of the respective department. Administrative section is headed by the section officer and all

the non teaching staff of the college work under his guidance. The Principal ensures the collective efforts put in by the teachers, students, members of different committees and non teaching staff for improvement and effectiveness of the institutional processes and makes suitable course corrections wherever the need arises. The temporary recruitment for academic arrangements is done by the department of Higher Education Govt. of JK by inviting online applications from eligible candidates for all the colleges falling in Jammu Division. The nodal Principal of Jammu Division Colleges prepares a subject wise merit list of all the eligible candidates. The college Academic Arrangement Committee contacts the candidates through email and telephone. After proper verification of the credentials, the suitable candidates are allowed to join in the college for one academic session.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The up gradation of physical infrastructural facilities and allied facilities of an institution is a continuous process. Face lifting and up gradation of facilities like classrooms, laboratories, library, toilets etc. have been done. The process of providing WIFI/LAN facility to laboratories and smart class rooms of the institution is started for effective teaching and learning exercise. Installation of new computers, LCD Projectors, Xeroxcopiers at various locations in the college has augumented the process of teaching and learning. The college has a partially automated and computerized central library with a rich collection of reference and text books for the students of UG and PG programmes and the faculty. A new reading room is being constructed within the library complex for the benefit of the students. The college also runs an IGNOU centre.

Research and Development

The institution encourages and allows
the teachers and students to
participate and attend National
International conferences, symposia and
seminars to present their research
work. A provision for providing
financial support to faculty to attend
national and international conferences

and workshops is also at place. The college also encourages the faculty to write text and reference books and publish their research works in the reputed national and international journals. College recognizes and facilitates research work by the faculty and by the students. Project works assigned to students ensure their orientation towards research work. Examination and Evaluation The institution assesses concept based understanding, core learning and overall learning levels of the students through its vibrant examination system. All the students of UG and PG are required to appear in internal assessment test and the external end semester examinations in both theory and in practical courses. Internal assessment in practical courses is a continuous exercise comprising of performance in laboratories during the conduct of practical exercises, maintenance of the practical records, percentage attendance and formal examination. The external semester end examinations are conducted by the college after completion of the prescribed syllabi. The controller of examinations with the consent of the Principal issues notification for the commencement of examinations, the date sheet and the supervisory staff for the conduct of the same. The paper setting and evaluation of the answer scripts is done by the teachers approved by the board of studies of each subject. Complete secrecy is maintained in the generation of hall tickets, printing of question papers, evaluation of answer scripts and compilation of results. A centralized examination cell redresses grievances in accordance with the rules and regulations, related to end term semester examinations like out of syllabus questions, repeated questions, improper split of marks, evaluation of answer scripts etc. The process of reevaluation of answer scripts is also in place and this process gets completed in a time bound manner to save the precious time of the students. Teaching and Learning The teaching and learning is the basic aim of an institution. After admissions the institution organizes student orientation sessions at the departmental level to sensitize the new

entrants about the academic calendar, their role and participation in the development of the institution and to instill in them the feeling of belongingness for the college. In addition to the usual classroom teaching, the process for ICT enabled teaching pedagogy has been initiated by exploring the development of smart classrooms. Emphasis has been laid on the assigning project work, seminars and undertaking field visits to make learning an enjoyable exercise. Guest lectures by experts from various fields of study, workshops, debates etc. have been organized to increase the knowledge base of the students. Curriculum Development The college is a multi faculty institution offering courses in different streams like sciences, BCA, commerce and social sciences under CBCS pattern at UG and PG levels. The revision of curriculum for the UG and PG courses is a continual process keeping in view the skill development and employability of the learners. This revision of the curriculum is

periodically carried out by conducting board of studies (BOS) meetings of each subject. Inputs from all stakeholders (Students, Parents, Teachers and other experts) were sought through feedback mechanism to bring about improvement in the curriculum. The curriculum devised and designed by BOS is further deliberated upon in Academic Council and Governing body for improvement of the courses.

All the circulars, notifications, Course syllabi, performance reports etc. for the college students and staff and other concerning agencies were uploaded on college website for wide circulation and easy accessibility. Moreover, college also utilizes JKCPIS (Jammu Kashmir Centralised Personnal Information System) database for administrative purposes, which is an egovernance application of Govt. of JK. This reduced the time consuming process of compiling information, which are required very often.

Seminar halls fitted with energy efficient electric appliances. Students and faculty are conscious to switch off the electrical and electronic devices of the classes when not in use. Efforts for carbon neutrality: Waste collected every day , degradable waste buried near trees and in a pit in one corner of the college so that it becomes manure for the trees and other vegetation. Non degradable waste is regularly collected by local agencies for recycling. Polythene bags are banned in the college. Botanical garden of college is loaded with green foliage, well maintained with flowering plants and crotons. Burning of waste is strictly prohibited in the college. notification No. 10411-510 dated-15/09 2014 in August 2020.As such the College shall apply to the UGC for review of the autonomous status. NAAC has extended the validity of Accreditation of the college till 31/12/2019 and the submission of the IIQA for the Cycle III accreditation shall be made by December 2019. The following Activities shall be vigorously undertaken to improve the overall academic and extension pursuits of the College. 1. National Seminars and Workshops aimed at developing the faculty outlook and academic prowess shall be organized 2. Student exchange Programmes with other universities and academic institutions will be organized by signing suitable MOUs to that effect. 3. Practical Component shall be added in the curriculum of the Environment sciences and Skill courses offered by the College 4. Research activities shall be boosted by assigning minor research projects to the students of PG programmes of the college 5. Summer camps shall be organized for the students for imparting them employable skills and job oriented counseling 6.
