**Assessment of the learning levels of the students and organization of special programs
for advanced learners and slow learners**

Session: 2016-2017

During the session 2016-2017 about hundred students were selected from semester first who were weak in chemistry subject by using different parameters like class tests, quizzes etc. In order to improve their knowledge in the subject and to make them more familiar with the subject, extra classes were conducted for them. Attendance was made compulsory and register was maintained for the purpose. The topics chosen by the students were discussed in detail in particular. Books were given to the students by the teachers who were unable to buy the books. After every week their class tests were conducted to check the improvement in the subject. The seminars were also organized on different topics of the syllabus to make students to speak. Students who were very weak were given individual attention. Moreover, groups of the students were made with two group leaders who were good in subject to help the weak students to prepare for assessment tests and final examination. They were also given extra time in practical classes. The improvement in the students was quite encouraging.

Besides, there were extraordinary students in the class. We gave them extra knowledge on various topics of chemistry. If they had any difficulty somewhere, they were guided by the teachers. They were also made the group leaders of the groups of the weak students. They were given some extra topics for seminars and quizzes. They showed extraordinary enthusiasm in learning new topics and showed remarkable results.

Session: 2016-2017

In semester second of the session, the performance of around 80 students was not found up to the mark based upon various tests, quizzes and surprise tests conducted. So it was our foremost duty to make them understand the subject thoroughly so that they can do well in the subject. The following initiatives were taken:

- 1) Extra classes were arranged for the weak students.
- 2) Attendance was made mandatory and attendance register was also maintained.
- 3) The topics selected by the students were discussed thoroughly.
- 4) Regular tests were taken to see their improvement in the topics taught.
- 5) Quizzes were held on the topics discussed in the class.
- 6) Seminars were held on the different topics of the syllabus among various groups of the weak students. Students who showed improvement were encouraged and motivated.
- 7) They were given extra time in practical classes.

Students showed remarkable improvement in their results.

The extraordinary students were also given special attention. Extra knowledge was imparted to them on various topics. They were asked to prepare different models/projects. The students showed extraordinary enthusiasm in learning extra topics on the subject

Session: 2017-2018

During the session 2017-18, the slow learners in the class of B.Sc. Semester-I were spotted out by various teachers involved, after the regular class work was carried out for a month, by the process of personal interaction with students during theory as well as during practical class work, by conducting regular and surprise tests and by giving various home assignments.

A total of 78 students were chosen for special attention. 27 special sessions were conducted to help the students in learning the concepts in various topics of the syllabus suggested by themselves. During these sessions the emphasis was on one to one interactions to meet their requirements in the subject. The topics were made interesting by including audio and video lectures from internet. After every three days a class test in the form of quiz was conducted. Every week a revision test was scheduled to revise the concepts covered in that week. The response of the students was very encouraging; they started performing good in the class tests and finally did well in the end semester examination.

The abilities of quick learners were enhanced by a series of tests, seminars and by assigning small projects to them.

Similarly 69 students were chosen from Semester-II after accessing their daily performance in class tests and home assignments. However, some students themselves opted to attend these extra classes. Among these 69 students of Semester-II, only 35 were from the special batch of previous Semester. Thus more than 50% of the students of the previous batch of slow learners had gained the pace of learning and were performing good in this Semester. For this special batch of Semester-II, a total of 23 extra classes could be arranged. Every day the students themselves suggested the topic of discussion for the next day. The strategy of teaching was again the same that is slow and steady, involving students, organizing quizzes twice a week and conducting test once a week. The students were encouraged to participate in

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the seminars among the group of eight to ten students voluntarily. In this session, again the students were shown related topics on You Tube in the college smart class room and the results were very satisfactory.

The students showing good results keeping good pace of learning with the class room teaching were encouraged to read the standard reference books available in the college library. They were motivated to prepare for the competitive examinations along with the college curriculum. They were given small projects to be completed by themselves to develop self confidence in them and to inculcate the habit of consulting standard reference books.

Session: 2018-2019

Just how five fingers of the same hand are not the same, similarly, not every child sitting in the class is the same. It's easy for some students to grasp things easily in one go, while some students might have to read the same thing several times in order to have a clear understanding of that particular concept. Such students need special attention and focus from the teachers to clarify their concepts better. The strength of a class may rarely be one and will always have a mix of students - students with quick learning capacity and students with slow learning capacity. Students who had difficulty in grasping lessons in a classroom were provided with different educational strategies, clarifications, repetition of content, and individual attention was also paid.

A list of good and weak students was prepared. Good students mean those students who are fast learners and pick up subject easily. These students were asked to help the class and promote the subject. Students from semester I were chosen as they will be in the college for next three years.

Roll No. 17, 22, 30, 34, 50, 52, 56,81, 112,121, 241,262, 344, 507, 511, 512, 517, 524, 534, 537, 538, 548, 549, 603 and 682 were intelligent students from 2018-19 batch of semester I and II.

Remedial classes were conducted for the students who need special guidance from the teachers. These classes specifically focus on the topics that have already been taught in the class. The same topics were repeated and explained again in the remedial classes for the students who have difficulty in understanding them easily.

List of slow learners from semester I were made by faculty members who were teaching them as per their performance in class and laboratory. In total 43 students were given extra lectures in semester I. 49 additional classes were conducted for these weak students.

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In semester II, it was found that many students had developed interest in chemistry and were now good in the subject. After one month of classes in semester II, again 44 weak students or slow learners were picked for additional classes in chemistry for two months. Some students (60, 67, 88, 117 etc) were found better than their previous semester's performance. Attendance register was maintained.

These extra remedial classes had helped students a lot. These students identified as slow learners got special attention during extra classes.

Assessment of the learning levels of the students and organization of special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Session: 2019-2020

Our college admits students both from local and rural areas of different parts of J&K and these students were from different socio-economic backgrounds. This year about 471 students opted for chemistry as one of the subjects in their degree course i.e., B.sc Semester 1. During the regular class work, it was observed that all the students do not learn at the same pace, some were slow and some were fast learning students. After teaching for some days, it was found that about 84 students did not communicate well. They did not seek help in clearing their doubts due to shyness and needed special attention. On the basis of daily response during interaction in the classroom and performance in practicals, class tests, in theory as well as practicals, these students were found to be slow learners with weak basic concepts. For these students about 30 special classes were conducted. The questions were asked on the topics taught previous day and tests were conducted from time to time. Quiz competitions were also organised to involve maximum number of students. Students were asked to prepare charts on the topics of their interests and projects were given on the topics being taught. The sitting arrangement was rotated from backbenches to front benches. These students were advised to visit college library for consulting reference books. This exercise of conducting special classes proved fruitful and effective. It was very well reflected from the results they obtained on the conclusion of semester end examinations.

Likewise, 62 students were chosen from semester 2 after assessing their performance in theory and practical classes. There were some previous semester students and even some good students also voluntarily opted for these classes. These students were also given class tests, quiz competitions, seminars and small projects. They were encouraged to consult video lectures along with reference books also. All these exercises proved to be a boon for these students and many of them obtained good marks in their final examinations.

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Besides, the extraordinary students were also given special attention. Extra knowledge was imparted to them on various topics. They were asked to prepare different models/projects. The students showed extraordinary enthusiasm in learning extra topics on the subject.

After admission a meeting was held to discuss various issues of students during session 2016-2017. In meeting it was discussed that student are coming from different backgrounds and IQ levels. Moreover, they are having different learning capacities. Therefore it was unanimously decided to make a list of students who are slow learners. We had enlisted slow learners and advance learners by using following measures/steps:

1. Considering their merit
2. Checking their attendance
3. Approach during the class
4. One-on-one interaction

Some of the remedial measures taken by us to enable the students to improve their performance are listed below:


- A proper timetable for the weak students were framed
- Proper lesson plan were prepared to inculcate the knowledge in their minds
- Class tests were frequently taken to check their basics
- Resources were provided to weak/ struggling students
- Practical practices of teaching was followed than theoretical teaching
- Emphasis was also given about parents-teacher meeting so that parents well get aware of their wards
- Regular guidance and counseling were provided to enhance their performance in studies
- Advance learners were encouraged to study beyond the course content. Books on critical and creative thinking were recommended. They were also encouraged to participate in debates and quiz competitions

Just after the admission of the students, the staff meeting was held in the Department of Botany to discuss various issues to ensure smooth academic session. However, it was emphasized in meeting that students are coming from different backgrounds having different IQ level and different learning capabilities. Keeping in mind main agenda of meeting, it was decided to frame a list of slow learners and take some remedial measures for such students who have lagged behind in their studies. We decided to make a list of slow learners and advanced learners considering various parameters such as:

- Academic merit
- Checking their attendance
- Approach during classes
- One to one interaction at the end of class to get their feedback
- Internal assessment result score /Mock tests score

Unfortunately due to COVID-19 pandemic lockdown, we switched over to online mode of teaching. During online teaching learning process, some of the remedial measures taken by us to enable the students to gain positive impact and take them at par with the rest of students are

- ❖ We telephonically contacted them to understand their reasons of weakness, after listening them appropriate assistance were provided
- ❖ Precise direction were given to students and their parents and they were informed about which online learning tools can be used.
- ❖ Encouraged active participation of vulnerable students in classes.
- ❖ Study material was provided to them. They were also given home task for the next class, which helped them to be regular in class.
- ❖ To clarify their concept regarding a difficult topic interactive tools, videos, info graphics were used
- ❖ Extra classes were conducted for weak students to clear their concepts
- ❖ Mock tests were conducted frequently to check how the learning is taking place
- ❖ Required and necessary material were provided to them in the form of handwritten notes, PPT, PDF files

Unfortunately in second consecutive session (2020-2021) COVID-19 pandemic lockdown continued and hence college opted continuously online teaching learning process. In year 2020-2021 staff meeting was held in the Department of Botany to discuss an urgent issue regarding remedial measures for students who have been in a crisis over the past several months since their college was closed suddenly, cutting them off from their teachers, peers, and college support.

Some of the remedial measures taken for slow learners are given below:


- ❖ Students were contacted through email, what's app, to know their concerns and academic needs, demonstrate their understanding as well as empathy.
- ❖ Created a natural relationship by sharing knowledge, ideas & experiences among mentees.
- ❖ Mentees gained valuable advice, expanded their knowledge, skill & experiences
- ❖ Remedial classes for weak students in order to help them.
- ❖ Accurate information regarding **COVID-19** was provided to students.
- ❖ Students were guided and helped to upload their answer sheets related to their online examinations, besides this some students were provided extra time to submit their papers or assignments.
- ❖ Awareness was provided to students regarding e-learning, online teaching apps, or technology that can be used in online classes to make teaching- learning successful
- ❖ While interacting with students it was realized that they are in need of study material, hence said material was also uploaded
- ❖ Efforts were also made to mitigate their difficulties by taking extra online classes or by calling them in small groups in collage.
- ❖ Some interested students were provided extra material/ books for competitive exams

Methods/Modes of Assessment of enrolled students (2020-2021)

The academic merit of the previous class examination although speaks about the academic excellence of students enrolled in different sections of zoology stream yet the faculty pursues the different methods of assessment during the ongoing academic session. The methods adopted are:

Assessment of the learning levels of the students and organization of special programmes for advanced learners and slow learners (2018-19)

It is a harsh reality that every year students of different socio-economic backgrounds, regions/area sought admission in GCW Parade in different streams. Hence, their level of understanding the subjects/concepts is also different. In order to improve the academic standard and enhance the knowledge and skills of students to the optimum level, sem-I, On the basis of their performance in class tests and oral questioning in theory and practical classes, students who joined the department in B.Sc. sem-I, were divided into two groups (i) Fast learners and (ii) Slow learners.

These students were guided according to their capabilities to explore best talent in them. The students placed in the fast learner group were guided for achieving their goals. These students were given extra time to inculcate their interest in the subject and guided for preparing competitive exams like NGPE, NET, SLET, Civil services etc.

The students who were weak in understanding the basic concepts and derivations in the subject were given more time by taking extra classes/tutorials. These students were taught from simple to complex to encourage and improve their confidence level. All the teachers in the department were asked to encourage such students in the class and appreciate their role even for doing little things. They were advised to do more writing practice and consult to their classmates without any hesitation in case of any difficulty in the subject. Individual attention was also paid to the students, especially belonging to the poor background and neglected rural areas.

Some humble and kind hearted students who were good in studies were also asked to guide and help such students in their studies. Charts explaining the different concepts pertaining to various experiments were displayed in the labs for such students. These practices followed for the fast learners as well as slow learners in

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the department yields very good results. It was observed that number of students desirous of participate in competitive exams/quiz tests increased considerably.

It was also observed that a list of 30 students identified as slow learners reduced to 25 in Sem.-II and even more of them had improved to a greater extent from their previous academic record of B.Sc-I. These students were showing more zeal and dedication. The sitting arrangement for students in the class was rotated from back benches to front to remove their shyness and improve the confidence level of the students. The whole exercise of conducting special classes and other measures taken, proved fruitful, effective and yields very good results. Assessment of the learning levels of the students and organization of special programmes for advanced learners and slow learners (2019-20)

Our institution admits students from urban and rural areas of different parts of J&K and these students belong to different socio-economic background. During the academic year – about 193 students opted for physics as one of their subject in B.Sc. course. On the very outset of the session, general lecture was delivered by the staff member in the form of interaction for the orientation of these students in the college. During the regular class-work, it was observed by the concerned teacher that students are not getting the concepts in the subject at the same place. Some of them were picking the topic/concepts very quickly whereas some of them were found to be very weak in understanding the taught lessons/concepts in the subject. Thus, on the basis of daily response during the interaction in the classroom, class tests and performance in practicals, 18 students were found to be slow learners with weak understanding of concepts. It was also observed that these students did not seek the help in clearing their doubts due to hesitation and shyness. Hence, needed a special attention.

For these students about 18 special classes/tutorials were conducted. During these classes, they were taught about the basic concept for the general topics as per their syllabi. These students were encouraged and appreciated even on doing little things just to improve their confidence and interest in the subject. They were asked to prepare charts and little project works and advice to read and write concepts from the textbook. They were also advised to visit departmental as well as college library regularly. Also different class tests/Quiz were conducted to improve their academic standard upto the optimum level.

The sitting arrangement for students in the class was rotated from back benches to front to remove their shyness and improve the confidence level of the students. The whole exercise of conducting special classes and other measures taken, proved fruitful, effective and yields very good results. It was very well reflected from the results of the students in the semester-end examination.

Similarly 18 students were chosen as slow learners in semester-II after assessing their performance in theory and practical classes. There were some previous semester students and even some meritorious/good students also voluntarily opted for joining these classes. About 15 lectures/special classes were conducted for these students out of which few lectures were conducted to improve their basic concepts related to the prescribed syllabus. These students were also given class-tests, small projects, seminars and quiz competition. These students were also advised to watch video lectures and also consult reference books. All these systematic measures taken proved to be a boon for these students and many of them secured good marks in their semester-end examination.

In addition to the special attention paid towards the slow learners, the extra ordinary students in the subject were also taken care of by taking extra classes to impart higher and valuable knowledge to them in various topics in addition to the prescribed syllabus. They were also advised to visit departmental as well as college library regularly and study the magazines like physics for you, and consult the reference books for acquiring more and more knowledge. Moreover they have been provided extra study material in the form of e-resources in the subject. They were given more quiz competition and advised to prepare for the competitive examination like NGPE, NET, and SLET etc at the state as well as national level. These students showed extraordinary quest and enthusiasm in acquiring the extra knowledge about the subject in addition to the topics in the prescribed syllabus.

Assessment of the learning levels of the students and organization of special programmes for advanced learners and slow learners (2020-21)

During the session 2020-21, after the completion of admission process about 150 students joined the Physics department in B.Sc.-I under various combinations.

Just after the orientation session by the HOD and senior faculty the regular class-work begin. Soon after few classes by the concerned teachers about 10 students were identified as weak in understanding the subject and even found weak in understanding the basic concepts. It may be due to the different socio-economic background of the students. Moreover, previous performance of students was also taken into account to classify such students. It was decided by the HOD with sweet consent of concerned teachers that extra remedial classes will be conducted for these students in order to clear their doubts and concepts to improve their academic standard.

Therefore, as a policy matter of the department like previous years, 25 remedial classes /lectures were conducted for these students in which extra time with individual attention was given to each student for encouraging and improving their academic standard. Class tests, quizzes, webinars were conducted. Topics were made interesting by including audio and video lectures prepared by the faculty and from the internet. These students were advised to seek the help of internet and youtube and study from the reference textbooks for the better understanding of the concepts.

Not only the attention was given to slow learners but emphasis was laid to improve the academic standard of fast learners. Such students were advised to consult various physics magazines, reference books and internet. Such students were encouraged to prepare and participate in competitive examinations such as NGPE, SLET, NET, JRF etc.

The joint efforts of students and teachers became fruitful as semester-end result of the slow learners improved considerably. Taking it as welfare policy, even some


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students who were quite good in studies joined this group of slow learners in sem-II, thereby increasing the number to 20.

A total 18 extra classes were conducted for this batch of students. Everyday students themselves decided the topic of discussion for the next day. The strategy of teaching was again the same involving students, class-tests, organizing quizzes and webinars. The students were also guided to seek the help of internet and youtube.

All these exercises proved to be boon for the students and considerable improvement was reflected in the semester-end examination.

2.2.1 Regarding Slow and Fast Learners

The lectures are delivered in a language that a majority of students are comfortable in understanding and hence a mixture of Hindi and English is used as the medium of instruction.

The lectures are delivered keeping in mind various factors like:

The course curriculum has to be finished in a stipulated time.

The learning abilities of students vary from slow learners to fast learners and a range in between these two.

Keeping in view the above factors, the teachers of the department deliver their lectures at a pace and level keeping in mind the majority of the students whose learning capacity is at the intermediate level.

In the one hour lecture, at least 10-15 minutes at the end of the lecture are earmarked for students to raise questions and queries pertaining to the lecture delivered on that particular day.

In addition to this, after the teacher is done with the teaching of a particular unit, a full lecture (of one hour duration) is taken in which students can raise questions and doubts, if they still have any, and are motivated to indulge in discussions comments and observations with regard to the particular unit which was taught in the preceding classes. The subsequent unit is not taken for teaching as long as any doubts and queries pertaining to the preceding unit are not resolved.

Slow Learners: The slow learners are motivated to attend the doubt clearing lectures after the completion of each unit and are asked to raise questions and clear their doubts. This practice ensures that even if they lagged behind a bit in understanding the daily lectures, they make up for this lag in the doubt clearing lectures.

Fast Learners: Students who exhibit sharp and extraordinary learning skills are asked to further sharpen their intellect by various ways. They are recommended to read original texts of various philosophers and are asked to get themselves involved into serious thinking about the various philosophical issues that they learn in the classroom. They are asked to come up with novel

ideas, observations, critical comments and discussions in the classroom. These classroom practices not only help these advanced learners but also help the rest of the students as their mind is automatically drawn towards these critical and serious debates and their intellectual capabilities are also enhanced in this process.

2.3.1 Participative Learning:

Right from the day they enter the Philosophy department, the students are made aware of the fact that Discussion, Debate and Dialectic is the core method of understanding Philosophy and by extension any science which uses thought as a medium of acquiring knowledge, in other words any concept or idea is understood and further evolved only via an intense exchange of thoughts. Particularly in Philosophy, where the content is explicitly theoretical, discussions and debates take central prominence. Thus our teachers ensure that every single topic that they teach is accompanied by a healthy culture of discussion and debate on the topic in question. These discussions happen on a daily basis- a bit in between the lectures and more prominently at the end of the lecture. In addition to this, after the end of each unit, one day is earmarked exclusively for doubt clearing. During these doubt clearing classes also, students are also motivated to engage in discussions on various Philosophical themes.

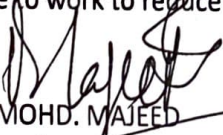

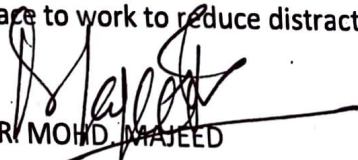

STEPS TAKEN FOR SLOW LEARNERS

- **Compensatory Teaching**

Compensatory teaching is an instructional approach that alters the presentation of content to circumvent a student's fundamental weakness or deficiency. Compensatory teaching recognizes content, transmits through alternate modalities (pictures versus words), and supplements it with additional learning resources and activities (learning centers and simulations, group discussions and co-operative learning). This may involve modifying an instructional technique by including a visual representation of content, by using more flexible instructional presentations (films, pictures, illustrations), or by shifting to alternate instructional formats (self-paced texts, simulations, experience-oriented workbooks).

- **Remedial Teaching**

This is an alternate approach for the regular classroom teacher in instructing the slow learner. Remedial teaching is the use of activities, techniques and practices to eliminate weaknesses or deficiencies that the slow learner is known to have. For example deficiencies in basic math skills are reduced or eliminated by re-teaching the content that was not learned earlier. The instructional environment does not change, as in the compensatory approach. Conventional instructional techniques such as drill and practice might be employed.

- **Encouraging Oral Expression Instead of Written Reports**

For slow learners, many writing assignments go un-attempted or are begun only half-heartedly because these learners recognize that their written product will not meet even minimal writing standards. A carefully organized taped response to an assignment might be considered. This has the advantage of avoiding spelling,

syntax, and writing errors.

- **Providing Peer Tutors for Students needing Remediation**

Peer tutoring is another effective ally to teaching objectives, especially when tutors are assigned so that everyone being tutored also has responsibility for being a tutor. The learner needing help is not singled out and has a stake in making the idea work, because his or her pride is on the line, both as a learner and as a tutor.

- **Monthly test to evaluate the progress of weak students**

Monthly tests are also taken to evaluate the progress of slow learners. The result of the test is communicated to individual student and further course of action is decided accordingly.

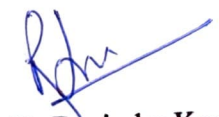

1. Slow learners have limited cognitive capacity.
2. They fail to cope with learning situations and to reason abstractly.
3. One of the pertinent characteristics of slow learners is poor memory. It occurs due to lack of concentration.
4. Classroom situations include distraction and lack of concentration of slow learners. This typical behaviour is also associated with poor motivation.

5. Inability to express his ideas through language is another significant characteristic of a slow learner.
6. A slow learner also lacks imagination and foresight. They faces difficulty to foresee consequences in the future.
7. In developing societies, has slow learners invite social as well as educational problems.
8. Of course, some dull students are very poor in scholastic achievements in the college. Their performance is not satisfactory. But some students who come from sophisticated homes show good performance, because they get help and encouragement from home. This is only possible at the primary stage of education.

SOME USEFUL CLASSROOM TECHNIQUES FOR SLOW LEARNERS

1. Additional classes have been conducted for the slow learners Basic concept of the Punjabi literature like poetry, sufism, kissakaav, stories, novel, natak drama, essay, grammar, and folk literature have been discussed in the additional classes by using different languages like in the other language moreover these concepts have been explained by giving them different examples. These classes are based one to one contact with the students. The stress is emphasized on the learning by doing learning through repetition and practices discussions and class test have been conducted in the class MCQ, multiple choice questions, true false have been asked in the class to make certain concept more clear to the slow learners.
2. Make each daily lesson complete in itself so that the slow learners can learn it easily.
3. Always make directions clear by writing them on the White board.
4. Do not try to force slow learners to do when they are not really interested.
5. Try to think of new ways to review concepts.
6. If there are several approaches to a new concept, use one per lesson to avoid confusion.
7. Always clear all doubts of literature to week students.

Assesment of the learning levels of the students

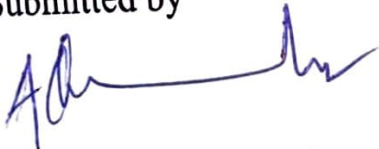

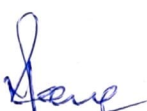

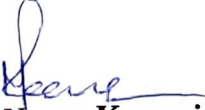

After successfully completing class 12th, with a zeal to do Bachelor's degree and to fulfill their dreams many students join the college every year. After admitting these young guns whom we call as the future of the nation, a sturdy task has been assigned to the faculty of the department to introduce them to their upcoming future and train them to face the competitive world waiting for them outside the gate of the college.

With this tough task in their hands, the faculty of the department starts scrutinizing the students allotted with Dogri subject. While scrutinizing the faculty members take many parameters under consideration to categorise the students into Advance learners and Slow Learners. This categorisation is essential so as to prepare the students as learners who really want to learn, improve, grow and propagate and revive their Mother Language Dogri which is on the verge of extinction among the youth of Duggar Pradesh. Language is the backbone of a culture and civilization and it also acts as a link between the future generations and the civilization.

The faculty of the department do this most basic thing in very responsible manner on the basis of the undermentioned parameters :

1. The basic knowledge of the students with Dogri as one the subjects in their previous class has been tested by adopting various

basic techniques like Speaking skills, reading skills, writing skills.

2. The students who have not opted Dogri as one of the subjects in their previous class have been tested through their speaking and reading skills only.

3. The students who speak, read and write Dogri correctly and grasp the concepts with and reproduce these concepts in an efficient manner are categorised as Advanced learners whereas the students who are not so good at doing the things mentioned earlier are categorised as Slow learners.

4. The basic reason to categorise the students as Advanced and Slow learners is to identify the real learners of the Language and not just the beings who have joined the college just to pass the class. As a Dogra it is our ardent desire to revive, preserve and propagate our Mother Language Dogri which was once the sole official language of the state during the reign of the visionary Maharaja Ranbir Singh.

5. The students are also tested through Quiz competitions, story telling competitions, etc.

6. They are also evaluated through objective type questions asked at the end of the every lesson they have taught. The students who answer promptly are categorised as Advanced learners whereas the students who are unable to answer in a prompt manner are categorised as Slow learners.

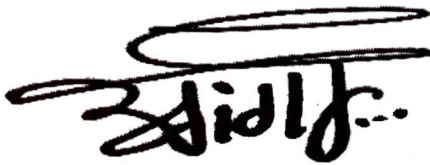

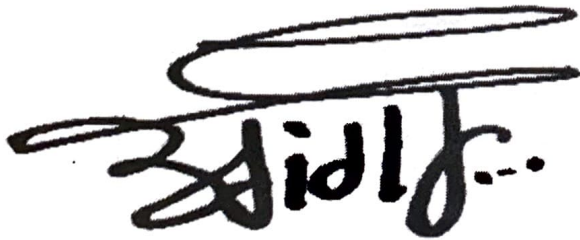
