The Department been an integral part of the college's academic framework since the institution's early years when Maharani Tara Devi founded it in 1944. It has a robust faculty comprising of 07 Associate and 06 Assistant Professors dedicated to providing quality education in English literature and language.

The Department offers Postgraduate Classes, in addition to Major and Minor Courses in Literature, Skill Courses, Ability Enhancement Courses, Vocational and Functional English Courses. The studies cover a wide range of subjects like Indian Writings in English, British Literature, World Literature, Women's Writings, Eco-Critical Writings, Human Rights and Literature, Children's Literature, Translation Studies, Communicative English, Soft Skills and much more.









A book reading competition was organized by the Literary Club of GCW Parade on the occasion of the World Book Day in order to motivate students to improve their reading skills. The convenor of the Literary Club, Dr. Ritu Magotra told the students that there are no better friends than books and that reading out loud itself is an art form which

A Film Screening marathon was organised by the PG Department of English to provide students with a unique opportunity to critically analyse literature through the medium of cinema. The aim was to enhance the understanding of literary themes, characters, and narratives by viewing adaptations of literary works. This event sought to promote visual literacy and foster critical thinking, bridging the gap between traditional literature and visual representation.

The chosen films for the screening were The Trial (1993, adopted from Kafka by Harold Pinter), Don Quixote (the unfinished 1992 English adaptation by Orson Welles), King Lear (1983, with Emmy winning Laurence Oliver as Lear) and Volpone (adapted from Johnson by Martin Foreman). The films were selected due to their strong alignment with the curriculum and their cinematic portrayal of complex literary elements. Prior to the screening, students were briefed on the historical, cultural, and literary context of the original text, setting the stage for a deeper engagement with the film.

After the film screening, students engaged in an interactive discussion moderated by the department faculty. The focus was on analysing how the cinematic medium interpreted complex literary symbols, motifs, and character arcs.

The screening was highly appreciated by the students, who found the experience both educational and enjoyable. It enhanced their appreciation for film as a narrative form and helped them understand the interpretative choices made in film adaptations. Students expressed that the visual portrayal of characters and settings enriched their understanding of the text and allowed for deeper insights into literary analysis.

Students of 3rd and 5th semester from the soft skills and personality management course which is run by the Department of English attended an insightful dining etiquette session at Virat Sarovar Portico.

The event was designed to introduce participants to formal dining etiquettes covering various customs rules and manners that enhance timing experience and personal interaction. The session introduced the students to the essentials of table setting across different dining styles. The use of cutlery was another crucial focus the instructor expand the correct way to hold and use each piece, particularly in formal settings. Settings were discussed where they arrangement of utensils on the plate communicates one's dining status. For example, placing the knife and fork in a crossed arrangement indicates a pause. Positioning them side by side in the middle of the plate shows that the meal is completed. These nonverbal signs are essential in helping diners to communicate without verbal introduction.

The dining etiquette session was immensely beneficial, offering valuable insights into formal dining through practical explanations. The students, accompanied by Prof. Meneka Thappa and Prof. Reena Bhagat who teach this skills course, gained an appreciation for the importance of manners and attentiveness at the dining table, skills that will enhance both our social and professional interactions in the future.



The Department of English at Government College for Women (GCW), Parade, Jammu, organized an educational visit to the Kala Kendra Book Fair on 14th November 2024- an event that was both enriching and inspiring for students and faculty alike. Overall, the trip to the Kala Kendra Book Fair and the



In an exclusive interaction with the Associate Professor Dr Rajinder Kour, 35 UG students of 5th semester from GCW Parade Department of English training for the Vocational Course titled English Language Teaching visited the B.Ed College of Education (Jammu) for practical learning. During this interaction she gave the students brief knowledge about micro-teaching skills which are essential for prospective teachers to master. Dr Rajendra Kour told the students that the concept of micro teaching was first introduced by Dwight W Allen at Stanford University in the 1960s. She also said that teaching is a multidimensional activity which is composed of a number of verbal and nonverbal acts. She proposed that in a normal class room there should be 30 to 35 students and the duration of the class should be from 35 to 40 minutes. An entire chapter can be discussed in this duration. On the other hand, for a micro classroom there should be 5 to 10 students. The duration of the class should be from 5 to 10 minutes and a single concept or skill should be taught to the students during this period. She also said that micro teaching has various phases like knowledge acquisition phase, skill acquisition phase and transfer phase. This was a two day interaction and we were accompanied by Dr Ritu Magotra and Dr. Renu Angurana from the department. The students benefited a lot from the interaction and the practical knowledge gained here would be useful for those who want to pursue teaching as a career.







The PG Department of English, GCW Parade Ground, Jammu, organized an enriching interactive session with Mr. Vishal Sharma, author of Wild Lilies in the Backyard. The event provided an inspiring platform for students, faculty, and literature enthusiasts to engage with the writer and delve into his creative journey. 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

The workshop concluded with a discussion of career opportunities within the field of lexicography. Students learned about the diverse roles lexicographers play, including as Dictionary Editors, Language Researchers, Translation and interpretation, Technical Writers, Content Creators, Linguistic Consultants. The key outcomes and recommendations that emerged from the workshop aimed at informing future initiatives in dictionary making and language documentation.
